


October 2, 2023

Discussion Leader: Al May



Seventy years after its publication, this novel remains a classic. Set in a bleak, dystopian era, -- banning books is suddenly current again!




December 4, 2023


Open the cover and be transported back to England, 1580's, where the Black Plague ravishes the countryside and a struggling young playwright must deal with life's difficulties.

Award winning author takes us to North Dakota to tell the tale of the fight against Native dispossession.




March 4, 2024

Published in 1953, Baldwin chronicles a fourteen-year-old boy's discovery of the terms of his identity as the stepson of the minister of a Pentecostal storefront church in Harlem. This too was once a banned book.
