From the Desk of Pastor Ginny

Dear Friends,

A few of our folks have begun to say their seasonal good-byes as they head off to North Carolina, Pennsylvania, or Montana. I am reminded of a church with a ritual for when children leave the sanctuary after a Children's Sermon. The pastor or other leader says: *Now we go our separate ways.* The children then say to the congregation: *God be with you here.* And the people staying in the sanctuary respond: *God be with you there.* It is a precious moment, reminding us of God's grace being with us wherever we go.

In the same way: for those of you who are leaving or have left: I assure you of our love and prayers, our commendation: *God be with you in the places where you go, until you return to us here.* We pray that you also hold us in your hearts as we remain here, engaged in the ministry to which God has called us in St. Petersburg and in Florida. We treasure your love and support even from afar.

For those of you staying here, I want to ask you to be as faithful in attendance at worship as you can be. We'll be here at worship at 9:00 and at 11:00. Both our sense of connection and our confidence get a valuable boost when we see each other, when we sing together, and pray together, and smile at one another. Your presence counts!

Some years ago, after serving a church for 14 years, I was given a sabbatical leave, four precious months to renew my heart, mind, and spirit. We asked the congregation to keep attending, to continue to support the church even though I was away. When I got back, I made a point to visiting church members and asking, "How did the Sabbatical go for you?" One of our older members was Verna G, who was not an officer, not in the choir, not part of a class or Women's circle, not even very well known in the church. When I visited Verna and asked about the sabbatical, she said, *Ginny, I went to church every Sunday you were away!* She was clearly proud to report that. I'm not sure I believed she had been there every one of those 16 Sundays, but I loved that Verna knew her presence counted. She had done her best to support the church, and me, by being there, by attending.

So, I just say to each of you: The long hot summer is before us. We'll each have things to do, and we'll be in and out of town. But your presence counts. It helps. It makes a difference. So come to worship when you are in St. Pete. Let's sing and pray together. Let's smile. It counts more than you might guess.

Staff Matters Five Questions for Dave Aumack

"I was flying a plane solo at 16 and a certified Pilot before I even got my driver's license," says Dave Aumack. "And I was sailing while still in my diapers." And he's followed both interests well into adulthood and through his military career.


As you know by now, our Personnel & Administration Committee is profiling our staffers the week of their birthdays. Dave's birthday is today, May 12th. He's our Director of Media, the guy sitting up in the balcony of the Sanctuary and in the back of the Youth Center, working several computers and multiple dials—along with his A-teams—to flash songs and words up on the screens for the congregation to see. All while now streaming both services online.

Dave was born in Miami and moved with his family when in the third grade to

Melbourne. His father had been with Eastern Airlines before taking a job with Lockheed Martin, a major contractor on the space shuttle. As a teenager, Dave crisscrossed Florida, flying in and out of the Merritt Island Airport hitting as many malls as he could. "I would shop and get something to eat, then go back home." Say what?! "Yeah. I had to get my flying hours in and that was the best way I knew."

Dave graduated from Florida State in 1999 on a meteorology scholarship. While there he put in four years with the Air Force ROTC on their scholarship program, coming out of school as a Second Lieutenant. He entered the Air Force the day after graduating.

He and wife Kendra and daughters Carrie and Becky, both still in their teens, live on a Catamaran with 900 square feet of living space in the St. Petersburg Marina; it's 38 feet long and 25 feet wide. While Dave works with us at FPC, Kendra is a pastoral assistant at First United Methodist in St. Pete and their daughters work there as well in the Audio-Video department.



Thanks for talking with us, Dave. We have 5 questions for you...

Q1: How long were you in the Air Force?

Dave: Retiring after 16 years, from 1999 to 2015, I had fun and did more than most but being away from home so much put a good bit of stress on our marriage. We married in 1999, moving 16 times during my service career. It was not until I retired that I really got to know our daughters, and they me, when they were 9 and 11.

Q2: Exactly what did you do in the Air Force?

Dave: I flew most of the time, piloting and commanding a Lockheed C-5 Galaxy cargo plane. In fact, I was the Air Force's eighth Lieutenant to command a C-5. If you don't know what this plane is, it's among the largest military aircrafts in the world. The cargo bay is one foot longer than the Wright brothers' first flight. It could carry 16 Greyhound buses, if necessary. It holds up to 80 passengers, up to 20 crew members, and over 100 tons of air cargo. I also was an instructor pilot for the C-5, T-37, T-6. Our crew often would fly 50,000 miles a week. Among other things, we carried bombs, flew earthquake equipment into Iran, and moved in relief supplies for victims of Hurricane Sandy. I mentioned being away from home...from 2002 to 2013, I average 303 days a year away. Between flights I was at home no more than 15 hours every 23 days or more.

Q3: You had two tours in Afghanistan. What were your most dangerous assignments?

Dave: I had many. When I wasn't flying into the combat environments every week-sometimes daily, I served as Safety Officer and Advisor to the Afghan and Iraqi Air Forces, liaising to the UN Mission regarding airspace, and plus a tour in Iraq. I had a lot of fun in the Air Force. But yeah, a lot of dangerous work, too, a lot of cloak-and-dagger stuff, walking around downtown Kabul and other areas in Afghanistan or Iraq. Frankly, I was shot at so often either in mid-air or on the ground, that I should be dead seven times over by now. And on one occasion, I was leading a convoy between bases that accidentally forgot to call out the correct exit in a turn circle. Reminiscent of a slap-stick comedy, we continued circling until I called for a different exit and as we left the circle, a bomb went off behind us.

Fun stuff but overall, I really enjoyed training and leading others. Putting myself and others in harm's way seemed just par for the course. I was offered and accepted early retirement as a Major in 2015, out of Special Operations Command South, in Homestead, FL. From there, we bought a boat and began sailing around.

Q4: You've gone to seminary. What led you from carrying bombs to feeling called to ministry?

Dave: This was my ninth time being called to ministry, but God is patient. On my journey to be a minister, I graduated in May of 2020 with my Master of Divinity from Asbury Theological Seminary, studying Greek and Hebrew and specializing in Counseling. While there, I kept praying and for some way to get started in ministry, aside from music leader as I cannot carry a tune. I came to First Presbyterian when I saw a posting for a youth minister here. That's now evolved into this full-fledged media position using all of the skills I've learned over the years, including expertise in computers, photo/videography, audio acoustics, leadership, safety and marketing.

Q5: What's your aspiration at this point, Dave?

Dave: While I'm working toward ordination, I guess you could sum up my aspiration as wanting to serve, lead, and teach. That's what I did all through my military career, as well as pre- and post-retirement. And I like to think that's what I'm doing here at First Presbyterian. Where this sense of mission leads me next, I don't know what door God will open next, but I know God has carried me thus far.
